## Librarian's Corner By Jim Pankiewicz

### The Tube Fly By Ken Sawada

This fall I have been busy purchasing some very interesting new titles for our club library; I'm anxious to tell you about them over the coming months. About 2 ½ years ago I started tying tube flies. Tying and fishing them has been a rewarding learning experience for me. Alas, I didn't fish them much this summer. Last summer, however, I had many enjoyable days pursuing *Oncorhynchus kisutch* and *Oncorhynchus gorboscha* with my tube flies in the salt. As a result of my foray into this new area of fly tying I recently became aware of a book called *The Tube Fly* by Ken Sawada. Ken lives in Japan. I had to mail order the book from him directly. The cost was over 8,000 yen plus shipping. Not only has he fished and written extensively he has also photographed flies extensively. Ken writes in Japanese. All of his instructions have been translated into English by Miyoko Ohtake so they appear in both languages, (Don't worry the pictures are all in English).

The author gives very limited introduction to tube fly materials; only the first 8 pages of the book are text. Following that are over 200 photos with detailed, step by step instructions on how to tie a wide range of tube flies. He finishes with an additional 300 color plates of a plethora of tube flies and how to dress them.

Even if you don't tie flies, the photography in this book is absolutely stunning. The patterns almost jump off the page. Our club copy of the book is hard bound, autographed, and comes in a protective jacket. At the time I made the purchase the book was not available in the USA. It may be now but only on a very limited basis and for a limited time. Come to the January meeting and see this unusual addition to our club collection. Merry Christmas wishes to everyone.

## Fishing For Kids 2007


But did you know that Jack has some culinary skills that are also creative? He called me the other night to let me know of a new way to cook fish. In his case that fish is stripped bass.
