

Blue Lake By Reed Miller

Blue Lake? Which Blue Lake? In Wolcott's "Lakes of Washington, Volume 1, Western Washington" there are 14 Blue Lakes listed. The one I am writing about is in Whatcom County, south of Mt. Baker, at an elevation of approximately 4000 ft., with a surface area of 13 acres.

But, back to the start. In a book about day hikes in the North Cascades, my son read about a hike to Dock Butte. This old lookout site at 5200 ft. elevation affords beautiful views of Mt. Baker, Twin Sisters and many other mountains. A trail forking off the Dock Butte trail drops down to Blue Lake. He decided to go on a picture-taking hike to Dock Butte. I decided, since it was only 0.7 miles, to go to Blue Lake.

According to Wolcott, Blue Lake held rainbows and Montana black-spot cutthroats. This sounded good to me.

So, on the last Monday in September, we drove to the trailhead, which is about 3900 ft. elevation. I put my gear into a day pack and took off for Blue Lake. It was a pretty level trail, but full of boulders and exposed tree roots.

The lake was calm and the water was very clear. A lack of weeds indicated a rather sterile environment, but I saw an occasional fish cruising near the surface and taking floating insects. They weren't large fish, maybe 8"-9", but they were fish. However, I'd left my dry flies at home.

The calm surface and clear water made the fish very spooky, but I finally got a fly to float. Eventually, a fish came along and took it. I set the hook, and after a short but spirited tussle I landed it, a 9" brown trout. Brown trout????!!!

I had never landed a brown trout in a high lake anywhere, be it WA, OR, ID, MT or WY and Blue Lake was no. 99 or 100 on my list. I took a picture of it and released it.

The lake seems to be self-sustaining, as I saw many fingerlings feeding near the inlet stream. The stream itself held many fry. So, add brown trout to the list of what Washington's high lakes can produce.

ATTENTION SNOQUALMIE RIVER ANGLERS

In 2004, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission renewed the operating license for the Snoqualmie Falls Hydroelectric Project owned by Puget Sound Energy. Terms of the renewal require Puget Sound Energy to fund resident trout research, conducted by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW), in the upper Snoqualmie Watershed above Snoqualmie Falls.

One of the research objectives WDFW wants to investigate is angler effort, catch, and demographics in the upper Snoqualmie Watershed. Since the upper Snoqualmie Watershed covers such a large geographic area and has several angler access points, conducting a traditional access-point creel survey would be very difficult and expensive to complete. Instead, WDFW is seeking the help of anglers who fish the upper Snoqualmie Watershed.

WDFW has installed several angler creel boxes throughout the North Fork, Middle Fork, South Fork, and main stem (above the falls) areas of the upper Snoqualmie Watershed. Attached to these creel boxes are catch cards that request information from anglers about their fishing trip. WDFW respectfully requests anglers who fish the upper Snoqualmie Watershed to please fill out and submit every completed fishing trip. Even if your fishing trip was unsuccessful, WDFW requests that anglers still fill out and deposit a catch card. Submitting catch cards for unsuccessful fishing trips is just as important as submitting catch cards for successful fishing trips.

For those anglers who fish the upper Snoqualmie Watershed routinely, WDFW has developed an angler diary program. Angler diaries contain several catch cards and request some additional information about your completed fishing trip.
